## Where are they now with Sean Barker.

G'day, I'm Sean Barker. When I graduated from The Henry Lawson High School in 1991, there was no internet, we actually talked on the telephone and mobile communication was a two-way radio.

My favourite extracurricular activities at THLHS were playing in bands and performing in school plays as well as playing Rugby League and Union. In junior high school I also enjoyed being in cadets, which involved going away on regular bivouacs with my mates. They were always lots of fun.

My favourite subjects were music, drama, art, history and English. I remember being disappointed I couldn't do music and art in senior high school; I chose music. I also enjoyed maths and economics. There was no senior drama class, so in Year 12 I dropped a subject and hung out in the library with Mrs Lynch. She gave me a grounding in drama and coached me for my acting school audition pieces. I am forever grateful.

Growing up and going to school your whole childhood in a small town forges friendships that stand the test of time. I have many fond memories of my high school days in Grenfell. The annual *triangular* contests were always a highlight. The Year 11 excursion to Jindabyne, the first time at the snow for most of us, was another. A Western Region Drama Camp at Western Plains Zoo was very special for me. I also remember an after school Rugby match on a soggy winter's day with a heavy paddock. It was a quagmire. Most of the school came down to cheer us on and we beat arch rivals, Forbes in a very close game. The atmosphere was incredible. There are few greater feelings than winning at home in the mud.

These days I'm a professional actor, voice artist, writer, director, musician, and teacher. I'm very lucky to have a rich and varied creative career. I studied acting at Theatre Nepean. There was a wonderful art school at UWS that sadly, has been defunded. School was great, but uni was something else. That's where I got to learn about all sorts of things I'd only ever heard about and other stuff I had no idea of until I got there. It was great hanging out and studying with actors, dancers, visual artists, writers, musicians, photographers and film makers everyday.

I get to do incredible things at work regularly, but some days are extra special. Some career highlights so far have been; receiving a grant from the City of Port Phillip to produce a play I wrote, calling my nan from my trailer while waiting on set to act in my first feature film, working on *Home and Away*, a show I did work experience on while at THLHS and having *Fearless*, a play that I appeared in and co-authored being selected as a Contemporary Australian Theatre text for HSC Drama.

My advice to young people is, go for it! This is it. Don't have a fallback, you'll only use it. Stand up for what you believe in, back yourself, follow your heart and pursue your dreams. Life is an amazing journey; enjoy it.





# **COMMEMORATING THE 150<sup>TH</sup> BIRTHDAY OF HENRY LAWSON AND THE 60<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF THE GRENFELL FESTIVAL**

**The Henry Lawson High School P&C Association and Community Commemorative Quilt Project.**

In September 2016 at a general meeting of The Henry Lawson High School P&C Association an idea was born.

"To make a Commemorative Quilt, to celebrate the diamond anniversary of the Grenfell Henry Lawson Festival of Arts, and the 150th anniversary of Henry Lawson's birth on the Grenfell Goldfields."

This idea was the brainchild of The Henry Lawson High School P&C Association Vice President, Helen Carpenter and member of the Executive Committee, Keryl McCann, also the owner of Fabric Sauce. In no time this idea gained support. Margaret Carey, the then Principal, was excited about the concept, and extended her support for the project by offering the use of Room 13 at the High School as the venue for the community collaborative sewing days.

Next was an informal planning meeting at the 'Mingle on Main' coffee shop, where the trio of Carly Brown, P&C President; Helen Carpenter, P&C Vice - President; and Keryl McCann, a member of the P&C Executive Committee, got together to discuss how this idea could be achieved.

A date for the completion of the "Community Commemorative Quilt" was set for 10 March 2017, and this would kick off the fundraising for Festival Queen Candidate, Vanessa Knight.

This was just the beginning with so much more to figure out. A brainstorming of ideas led to a series of questions, such as, how to get the community involved; Deciding the project title; Choosing the fabrics to work with; Picking the colours and the tones and most importantly, the size of the quilt. The next step was to decide the days sewing could be held, organising the raffle, gaining publicity and finally, how would they tie it all in with the local environment alongside promoting their High School.

They wanted to create a quilt that told a story commemorating the 60<sup>th</sup> Annual Grenfell Henry Lawson Festival of Arts, and the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Henry Lawson's birth on the Grenfell Goldfields in 1867. They believed

that for the event to be successful more people needed to be involved than just the High School Community and a decision was made to invite the broader community to take part in the making of the quilt, creating a bond and strengthening ties with the High School while celebrating the two momentous 2017 events.

Four sewing days were held over 2016-2017 and the following people were directly involved in the project: Helen Carpenter, Keryl McCann, Carly Brown, Sandra Hughes, Maree Neill, Jill Norris, Erica Moore, Margaret Carey, Madison Knight, Ali McCann and Mitchell Stevens.

During the course of the Quilts production ABC Central West interviewed Helen Carpenter about the Quilt and how it came to be and how people could be involved. Janelle Noack the quilt Pattern designer also came to visit and see the quilt in production and meet with those involved.

The Henry Lawson High School P&C Association Festival Queen Candidate for this commemorative year is Ms Vanessa Knight. Vanessa graduated from THLHS in 2015. Vanessa was an exemplary and diligent student, who was always friendly and courteous. In her graduation year Vanessa earned the title of Dux of the School.

On the 4<sup>th</sup> of February 2017, a festival queen twilight ball was held in Taylor Park. Hosted by the Grenfell Henry Lawson Festival of Arts Vanessa was in attendance on the night, and was the only queen candidate nominated at that stage.

In March this year the quilt was completed on time and ticket sales have been good, the P&C Association are hoping to reach their target of \$3000. The quilt will be drawn on the Saturday of the June Long weekend at the Henry Lawson Festival of Arts.

The Henry Lawson High School P&C Association are extremely grateful for the support the community has shown the P&C Association in the making of this quilt.

The fabric chosen was 100% cotton, with an environmentally friendly eco option of bamboo wadding internally. They wanted fabric that reflected The Henry Lawson High School colours of the 2 blues, and the Nordic connection to Lawson's Ancestry. The off centered blue cross of the Norwegian flag is based on the Scandinavian cross, widely used on Scandinavian National flags. The blue colour is symbolic of blue skies and the thousands of lakes in Finland. The White represents the winter snow, this blue cross colour is deliberately reflected in the quilt, as well as the inclusion of cream coloured backing to depict wheat stubble of the Weddin Shire.

The Fabric Pattern used is Nocturne, by Janet Claire. The fabric range Nocturne was inspired by its literary description: A Love Song to the Night. The design is from MODA Fabrics USA, a well-known and respected quilt company. The Pattern Designer is Janelle Noack, of Country Matters Design. The quilt pattern is Whirlygig, copyright 2006. Janelle is from Dirmesher in the Riverina. The Riverina is also the current

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### Learning Centre

### Well-being corner

**Never bend your head. Hold it high. Look the world straight in the eye.**

*Helen Keller*

Your body language says a lot about you. Others can tell when a person feels good about themselves, they stand tall (not slouched or hunched), look people in the eye (rather than avoiding eye contact) and smile (instead of frowning or looking grumpy). When people feel good about themselves, they appear relaxed, confident.

But even if you're feeling down or uncertain, you can still practice positive body language. Hold your head high and look people in the eye; challenge yourself to do it, even if you feel uncomfortable at first. With practise, you'll get better at it. Your confidence will increase and others will find you more approachable.

## Work Health Safety Training

Students have the opportunity to attain their Work Health & Safety (WHS) white card induction training at school on **Tuesday, 13 June, 2017**.

### What's involved?

THLHS has acquired the services of a trainer to deliver the NSW General Construction WHS Induction (white card) which allows participants on construction sites as deemed by SafeWork NSW. The induction will include training, textbooks and SafeWork NSW General Construction Induction certificates. It will involve six hours of tuition, followed by a knowledge test on the day. Students will be issued with a certificate on completion, which will be followed up with the WHS white card in the weeks following.

### Who should do WHS?

- Students from Years 9 and 10 who wish to do work experience in the building industry. For example, bricklaying, building, concreting, tiling, shed building, metal fabrication, plumbing, etc.
- Students who intend to do VET courses such as Construction and Metals & Engineering.
- Any other interested student who may think they will need this qualification in the future.

**Cost - \$65 for each student** – payable at the school office no later than Monday 29 May 2017.

Minimum number is 8, maximum number is 20.

### Please Note:

- Students must be at least 14 years, 1 month.
- The student will receive a Statement of Attainment "Work Safely in the Construction Industry CPCCOHS1001A" from a registered RTO.
- Students must have their USI (Unique Student Identification) number so the statement can be issued. USI numbers must be obtained online at [www.usi.gov.au](http://www.usi.gov.au) one week prior to attending the course.
