
Next week

Principal's five – parents, students, community and staff learning together:

What parents said about our school in the Tell Them From Me survey for 2018.

This report provides results based on data from 22 respondents in this school who completed the Parent Survey. The survey includes seven separate measures, which were scored on a ten-point scale. The scores for the Likert-format questions (i.e., strongly agree to strongly disagree) have been converted to a 10-point scale, then averaged and reported by topic. A score of 0 indicates strong disagreement; 10 indicates strong agreement; 5 is a neutral position (neither agree nor disagree).



The parent survey is based on a comprehensive questionnaire covering several aspects of parents' perceptions of their children's experiences at home and school. Successful schools foster greater communication with parents, encourage parental involvement in their child's schoolwork, and enlist parents to volunteer at the school and participate in school governance. The survey also provides feedback to schools about the extent to which parents feel the school supports learning and positive behaviour and promotes a safe and inclusive environment.

The Henry Lawson High School values parent input to improve what we do. Thank you to all the parents that participated. As seen on the graph, an area that stands out is parents supporting learning at home. Remember the triangle (parents-teachers-students). We all need to act and be part of our child's learning. This does not mean doing homework or assignments for them; it's about talking to your student about what is being learned at school, having a conversation about learning and encouraging students to value learning and strive for continuous improvement. Supporting learning at home is an area of discussion that we all need to have. The school is currently looking at ways to better support and assist with home learning.

Contact with your student during the school day

Parents who need to see a student or deliver something to a student are asked to come to the office and speak with our staff. Students will not be given permission to meet a parent outside school grounds for this purpose. This is a part of our school's child protection procedures.

Students were amazed by how different the world was back then. No mobile phones, laptops, internet or iPads ... how did people survive???


