Education



Requirements if students have COVID-19 symptoms

If a student or staff member is unwell and has any symptoms they should always test for COVID-19, either with a rapid antigen test (RAT) or PCR (nose and throat swab) test.

If the test comes back negative for COVID-19, the student or staff member should still not return to school until either:

- the student no longer has any symptoms, or
- a medical certificate is provided to the school confirming that symptoms are explained by another diagnosis (such as hay fever).

It is important that students do not attend school if they are unwell, even if they have tested negative for COVID-19. RATs can produce false negative results and symptoms of other illnesses can also be similar to COVID-19, including flu, the common cold and stomach bugs. Health advice is that students who are sick should always stay home to rest and recover and avoid putting other students and staff at risk of getting sick.

A reminder that if a student records a positive RAT, they/their family must register the positive test on the Service NSW website or Service NSW app so they can be linked to important health care support and advice. Please ensure that you they select our school name when prompted when registering a positive test result for a child.

The staff encouraged our students to apply for traineeships with their companies where they could potentially be supported with scholarships to assist their university studies.




Can I use my own calculator for the numeracy test?

No. The online numeracy test will have an on screen calculator. Try out the NAPLAN online calculator in the numeracy demonstration tests on the public demonstration site.

Do I need to touch type?

No. You do not need to be able to touch type to complete the tests.





What is tailored testing?

The test changes depending on your performance in the test. Questions will either get easier or harder based on your answers.

Conventions of language test important information

A message will appear on your device to let you know you have finished the grammar and punctuation section.

Check your answers before selecting 'Yes, I want to start the next section'.

When you select 'Yes, I want to start the next section', the spelling section will start and you will not be able to go back to the grammar and punctuation section of the test.

Lawsons Latest Sports Announcements - Term 1 Week 10

Sport

Sport over the past few weeks has been a great success! In week 6 students had the opportunity to learn more about how to play touch football from Touch Football NSW Development Officer James Galea. James took students through fundamental skills like placing the ball as well as defensive and offensive skills. Students were also taught the "box set" where a team does a full 6-player interchange within one set.

This term Year 7, 8 and 9 students were taught discus by Mrs Baker and representative competitor Annie Armstrong (Year 11), javelin by Mr McKnight and were put through their running paces with Miss Chesher. Opportunities to practise long jump, high jump and shot put were also available during sport in the lead up to the athletics carnival in Term 2.

Sporting Schools - Basketball

In Term 4, 2021 Miss Eppelstun successfully applied for a Sporting Schools grant of \$2500 to be used in Term 1 this year. Sporting Schools is an Australian Government initiative targeted to Year 7 and 8 students in secondary schools and designed to help schools increase children's participation in sport and connect them with community sport opportunities.

This grant money was used in week 9 to have Adam Marjoram, a development officer from Basketball NSW, deliver two full days of basketball to Year 7 and 8 students. Adam took students through various drills like dribbling, shooting and defence. Throughout the day and with each new skills activity students learnt how to play 3x3 basketball (which is now an Olympic sport!). Each day finished with a round robin competition of 3x3 where students were able to use their newly developed skills.
