


















CHS U15 Netball in Orange

Rugby Union 10s Gala Day

On Wednesday 19 October, 21 students from The Henry Lawson High School attended a Rugby Union 10s gala day at Southwell Park in Canberra. It was an early start leaving school at 6am but the boys were keen! Leading up to the gala day, students were given the opportunity to participate in two free clinics with Rhianna and Tyson from the Brumbies development team. Training with them helped the boys get into the game, learn the different rules, work together and always maintain a positive outlook.

The U14s team had some tough games throughout the day playing teams from Canberra, Goulburn and Cooma but played well to finish 2nd in their pool and 4th overall. Wyatt Durham knew he was having a good day when the opposition teams would cheer when they could finally tackle him. Harry Robinson was always setting his mates up for a try and demonstrated outstanding sportsmanship in every game. Cooper Dun's lifts in the lineout meant the boys could put constant pressure on the opposition. Nic Heathcote was an absolute cannonball throwing himself at the opposing teams no matter their size! Jethro Fenton's throws in the lineout were as awesome as his unforgiving runs making the opposition uneasy and keeping the ball with Henry Lawson. After being folded a bit like a paper aeroplane, Tom Whittaker got up and supported the team with field position - always being an option for the next carry. Charlie Ryan had great hit-ups always putting his body on the line to gain metres and stopped the opposition's defence with some great palms! Hayden Beaton was our halfback on the day and played every single minute of the 4 games played! He always kept a cool head behind the ruck and his mammoth effort was supported by other players supporting him with their clean outs and bridging of the ball. Kaden Johnstone's runs ensured that the team gained metres each time and he was rewarded with several tries in different games! The precision of his passing was on point all day, getting his teammates to hit gaps and get them over for their own points. In defence, the team could always rely on Tyson Lahay for his try-saving tackles, giving them time to get back to defend their line. Beau Bailey is one of those players where one moment he's on one side of the field and the next he's catching a screamer from Charlie to get around the defence and score a sneaky try while he's at it. The team put in place lots of skills they had been taught by Rhianna and Tyson, particularly Cooper and stripping the ball any opportunity they got.









The U16's team went on to win one of their four games as they were short staffed on the day, yet the boys still put up a good battle against all the teams they played playing with one sub the whole day.

In the first game the boys came out strong showing incredible dominance in the forwards with Tom Handcock, Jake Troth, Paddy Hundy and Hamish Baker taking some hard hits and making great tackles. Hugh Allen and Brodie Loader were seen at nearly every ruck defending their possession of the ball or contesting for the ball. The opposing team struck first with the first try of the game after some scattered defence. An epic chase down tackle from Chase Mcfarlane gave the team some time to relax, and the Henry Lawson boys struck next with a try to Chase from a greatly timed pass from Braydon Smith. The opposing team scored again at the end of the game in the corner as the boys were feeling a bit gassed. The second game did not go quite as planned, as the team the opposition were definitely not here to muck around, the forwards in this game found it extremely difficult to take control of the game and the score reflected a very tough run on the field.

In the third game the Henry Lawson boys knew they needed to bounce back from their last game, and so they did. The team were in control right from the first whistle and had the opposing team shook with the size of big Tommo and Paddy and the hard hits they put on. Some dominant tackles by Hugh and Brodie had the opposing team scared to run the ball. The first try was scored by the opposing team with another runaway try where the boys just quite couldn't keep up. But that did not have our boys worried at all, with the next try of the game being scored by Brodie off a scrum running down the blind side for a seven point try. The next try was scored off a line out that was won by Jake allowing Brodie to quickly grab the ball and immediately charged for the line and link up with Braydon to put him through a perfectly ran hole in the defensive line to score another seven point try.





The fourth and final game was another close one. The boys came out with confidence and determination in this game, with our forwards again making a huge impact at the start of the game to humble the opposition forward pack. This game Hugh and Brodie kept it consistent – getting to every ruck and each making dominant tackles as they had been all day. Braydon stepped up his running game for this game with the opposition being barely able to tackle him and handing out offloads like no tomorrow. The Henry Lawson boys scored four tries which were scored by Brodie, Ray McCann, Braydon and Paddy with two of those tries being off perfect passes from Riley Bowerman just after a break by Braydon with good support play around him. The other team matched the effort from Henry Lawson clinching a win by just one conversion.

All students should be incredibly proud of how they played and represented THLHS against much bigger schools on the day.


















Year 10 have worked hard on the rose garden

The whole school expectations are designed to support student understanding and engage positive and respectful relationships, while contributing points to their house.



The Jack and Cath Mullane Family Bequest Applications close on Friday 4 November 2022

The Mullane family has established a \$1000 bequest in their names to assist a student who has completed Year 12, in undertaking further study or training.

The Mullane family moved to Grenfell in 1969 with 4 of their 7 children to take up teaching posts at the school. Jack was the Deputy Principal and Cath taught English until 1974.

Jack predeceased Cath, dying in 2017, aged 98. Cath died in 2018 at age 99.

Students who would like to be considered for this scholarship will need to have completed Year 12 at The Henry Lawson High School and have firm plans to undertake further study and training.

Year 12 students received a letter this term from the principal, inviting them to apply for this scholarship, and providing details of how to apply. Additional copies of the letter are available from the front office.

Applications close at 4pm on Friday 4 November 2022. The successful applicant will be announced at our annual presentation day.
